

"Trust in the Lord with all your heart"

I tried to model my life on St. Francis' approach to the Lord Jesus, but did I really trust Him completely?

As I write this, today is the Feast of St. Francis of Assisi, my personal patron saint. His efforts began a charismatic renewal that touched the lives of thousands of people who experienced the Lord Jesus and the power of His Holy Spirit.

Right after I met the Lord lesus, He called me to the priesthood, and I spent the next four years at St. John Vianney, the college seminary in St. Paul, MN. I then started the graduate seminary but left after a semester because I wasn't sure what the Lord Jesus wanted for me as far as priesthood went. I knew He was calling me to the priesthood, but what kind? Religious or diocesan, active or contemplative, etc. I needed some questions answered before I went on. So I got a job and continued to pursue my

education. I tried to model my life on St. Francis' approach to the Lord Jesus, trusting Him completely and totally living for Him.

I thought I was doing more or less all right with that until one day in prayer the Lord Jesus said to me, "I am not first in your life." This totally surprised me. I thought He was, and if anyone had asked me if He was first, I would have said,

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"Of course He is!" But then He showed me that when it came to prayer, it was what I did after everything else got done. I prayed every day, but some days it was not much more than "Good night, Jesus..."

He showed me that He deserved the best of my day, not the leftovers— even if that meant (argh!!) getting up early to pray. He made it clear that an hour a day spent with Him was really necessary if I was going to let Him truly have my heart. That was a transforming experience.

Then one day in prayer He said to me, "You don't trust Me." Again, I was rather taken aback and asked what that meant-I thought I trusted Him completely! But then He showed me that when it came to my responsibility to financially support the Kingdom, especially my local parish, like my previous experience with prayer, I did it with the leftovers! He pointed out that there is a reason why giving was connected for the Jews with the idea of first fruits: that He deserved the best, not the leftovers.

I had excused myself by saying that I'm just a student, etc., etc. As I prayed I got the sense that the Lord was asking me to show Him where in the Scripture there's a tithing exemption for employed students?

I reasoned that my finances were too tight and so I'd make up for it later when I could afford it. Indeed, there were days when I would be at the bank waiting for the direct deposit from my hospital job to clear so that I could eat that night; it was really tight. Then He led me to Psalm 24: "The earth is the Lord's and the fullness thereof," reminding me that He is in charge of everything.

Things worked out better when I chose to trust Him.

That was the "nice" part of the lesson. Then He led me to Malachi 3:8: "Will man rob God? Yet you are robbing Me. But you say, 'How are we robbing Thee?' In your tithes and offerings." The idea that my refusal to responsibly tithe was robbing Him came as a shock. In the past, I had typically dismissed those verses by saying, "Well, that's just Old Testament stuff." The Lord Jesus made it clear that He did not find my approach particularly convincing. Imagine that.

So I started to tithe. I figured that the worst that could happen was that I'd miss some meals, which was ok since I needed to drop some weight anyway! But what I experienced instead was that things worked out better when I chose to trust Him.

Nothing was more

destructive to my relationship with the Lord Jesus than adopting an approach that essentially had said, "Take care of yourself first, and then give Him the leftovers," which I had been doing. It really amounted to a significant dimension of my life that was under my lordship and not His, and we all know how well that goes!

His actions gave me one more iteration on a constantly repeating theme: things go better if you do things His way! I hope at some point to actually fully live that! This approach, however, should not be confused with any kind of "prosperity gospel" approach, which basically amounts to a "give in order to get" approach. Rather, we choose to live in obedience to His Word simply because He deserves it and it's the right thing to do.

In His mercy, He continues to gently teach us and repeat these lessons in our lives. Hopefully, every time He does, we get just a little bit better and get it just a little more right, as we draw closer and closer to the King, Who is our Savior Who loves to save!

Please tell us a little about your background.

Peter: I'm 19, the sixth of seven children. My family joined Christ the King before I was born, so CTK is the only parish I've ever known. I was homeschooled until 10th grade and then attended Washtenaw Technical Middle College. I graduated in 2018, and I'm now in my final year at Eastern Michigan University.

Teresa: I'm 22, the fourth of eight children, and I was home-schooled through high school. Our family started coming to Christ the King when I was about 5. Seeing the whole church enter into prayer, even kids, was so cool for me. I was used to seeing people being really committed to prayer (my parents belong to a community called Companions of Christ the Lamb), but it seemed to me like something more for adults.

Were you involved in Fuel or Life Teen when you were in middle and high school?

Teresa: We didn't have Fuel yet; it began when I was about to start high school. However, I snuck into Life Teen as a middle schooler. © One night when my parents brought my older siblings to the Tuesday night prayer meeting, they had to bring me along, so I stayed in the back and loved it! I convinced my parents to keep bringing me. After I'd been there maybe six times, I let [former youth minister] Brad Schmidt know that I was a middle schooler. He let me stay, but

said that there would occasionally be times when he would ask me not to come.

Peter: I didn't go to Fuel the first half of 6th grade. I then went in January because all my friends said that they were going. It turned out that they didn't show up, but once I got there, I kept going. It was the first time that I saw people my age praising and worshiping God, and I dove right in.

The Fuel Team was so influential for me. When I was in 7th grade, one of the high schoolers on the Fuel Team asked if I wanted to have prayer for the gift of tongues, and I received it. I knew teens in high school who didn't have the gift of tongues, but because of that Fuel Team member, I did. Similarly, in Life Teen, being around young adults who were interested in you was super-helpful.

Teresa: The Life Teen Core Team really inspired me. Having these young adults working with the high schoolers was super special. I loved that the Core Team really cared about us.

What first got you interested in youth ministry?

Peter: When I was home-schooled, I had been involved in soccer, theater, etc. When I went to WTMC, I didn't have those things to do, and I wondered what I would do to fill my time. I was talking to Brad about it, and he invited me to serve on the Fuel Team. Fuel Team was incredible. Working with middle schoolers was great and being surrounded by a team to support you ... that was one of the highlights of high school.

When I left Life Teen, I wasn't thinking about youth ministry.

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Then, I was asked to lead a small group on the 2019 Spring Retreat and it was a really good experience.

Teresa: One night while I was still in high school, I went to a Tuesday night prayer meeting and from the moment I got out of the car, people came up to me, one after another, asking if they could talk to me and if I would pray with them. At the end of the night, I sensed the Lord saying that He didn't want me to be there for myself any longer, but for others.

When I graduated high school, I wasn't yet eligible to serve on the Core Team, so I asked John if I could stay on to help out the Fuel Team, which I'd been on. I didn't know if he would be open to that, but he seemed really excited to have the help.

What interested you in the A1:8 internship?

Peter: When the intern position was posted, I clearly sensed that it was what the Lord had for me. Everything then fell into place in terms of my school schedule, etc.

Teresa: I had to discern if I should even apply for the internship because it meant leaving Fuel – not just the middle schoolers, but the Fuel Team. But I sensed the Lord saying, "Don't you want to see what's happening in the Fuel Team spread to all the high schoolers?"

What are you doing as interns?

(They both laugh.)

Teresa: John let us know that we're figuring this out as we go!

Peter: We meet with John every week for three hours to pray and then discuss plans for what's coming up. On Tuesday nights, we're part of the Core Team at the A1:8 prayer meetings.

Teresa: On Sunday nights when both the middle school and high school programs meet, John wants to have the freedom to go back and forth between them where needed, so we're coordinating the Sunday night high school program.

Peter: For the first semester this year, we're doing a high school Alpha on Sunday nights. We want kids to be able to come freely and ask the questions that they want to have answered. Alpha is good for that, especially for the basic questions of Christianity.

Teresa: On Monday nights, we're attending the Encounter School in Brighton. I'm excited to share what they're doing.

Peter: The first quarter at Encounter is all about identity. It's so easy to forget your identity in Christ.

Teresa: We'll be working to bring that back to the teens.

What has been your favorite part so far?

Peter: I really enjoy getting to know the high schoolers. A1:8 is a very relational ministry; everything is about getting to know the teens. I love praying with people and seeing God break through.

Teresa: I love the Encounter School, and meeting with John and Peter, and getting excited about what the Lord is doing!

What are you looking forward to for the rest of the year?

Teresa: I'm really looking forward to the Fall A1:8 Retreat. It's going to be *so* good.

Peter: Seeing how God will transform A1:8. I don't know what that means, but we've sensed Him saying that it's what He wants to do.

If there was one thing that you could say to the folks reading this interview, what would it be?

Teresa: Don't underestimate the work the Lord is doing through you. I've been affected *so* much by people who have ministered to me.

Peter: Don't set limitations on what God can do in your life based on past experience. As soon as you put God in a box, you're in trouble. Letting Him out of the box is very freeing.

Anna gets a Catholic education at FGRHS

For you to be reading this

from me is something out of the ordinary. I came to the U.S. when I was six, an orphan from Kampala, Uganda. Only 7% of Ugandan girls attend school, and I would not have qualified.

Here I am now, having attended Fr. Gabriel Richard High School with a scholarship from FGR and subsidies from Christ the King something I never dreamed could happen, but that was part of God's exquisite plan for my life. My time at FGR allowed me to grow in a deeper relationship with God in such a way that now, as a college student, I am able to live my faith confidently and openly.

One of the unique aspects of Richard that I experienced was its community life, not only as a school, but as a class. About six months ago, the sister of one of my classmates passed away unexpectedly. At the funeral, about 85% of the senior class and several faculty members came in support of her and her family.

Going to Richard also enhanced my faith through serving as a Kairos leader, leading me to help



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my peers grow in their faith. I never realized the great gifts I received at Richard, such as,

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having teachers who truly cared about you personally and believed in you, even at times when you didn't be-

Through the eyes of a kid who never thought she would be granted an education, I cannot put into words how thankful I was to go to FGR. My hope is that other kids will be able to have the same experience in their education as I have had. I am so grateful to any of you in the CTK community who support FGR, both directly and through the parish!

In December 2006, Anna Nalukwago came to Ann Arbor to undergo extensive surgery and stayed with the Servants of God's Love as part of their ministry to medically fragile foster children. The sisters later adopted Anna, who is currently a freshman at **Grand Canyon University** in Phoenix, Arizona.

As Christian stewards, we receive God's gifts gratefully, cultivate them responsibly, share them lovingly with others, and return them with increase to the Lord.

"Oh gentle Jesus, it is really true that you are our peace, our tranquility, our serenity of conscience. No bitterness or sadness or poverty can touch the soul in whom you live by grace. It stands to reason that such a soul should have perfect happiness and ample wealth, for God is happiness itself without a trace of sadness or bitterness, and God is wealth itself, never failing, safe from any thievery."

—St. Catherine of Siena

It is easy in our consumeristic society to become anxious about our material needs.

Many take on excessive debt and live paycheck to paycheck. As a society, we often don't make good use of our time nor of our gifts and talents.

St. Catherine points us to the truth: God is wealth itself. I can more easily imagine that "God is love," but I don't often think of Him as wealth. But of course, this is true. Did not God give everything for us, including sending His only begotten Son to die for our sins? Will He not also provide for our material needs? (see Matthew 6:26)

"From those to whom much is given, much is expected." (Luke 12:48) As Christian stewards, we receive God's gifts gratefully, cultivate them responsibly, share them lovingly with others, and return them with increase to the Lord. Robert Morris, in his book *The*

There are more than 500 verses in the Bible concerning prayer and nearly 500 verses concerning faith, but there are more than 2,000 verses on the subject of money and possessions. Jesus talked about money in 16 of his 38 parables. Clearly, from the Bible's standpoint, we need to

understand money and how

to handle it.

Our approach to money and indeed, all the resources provided to us, is an important indicator of how we relate to the Lord Himself.

There are three underlying principles to consider in the stewardship of our talents and treasure:

- Everything in our life belongs to God, not us. We own nothing. God owns everything. We are simply stewards.
- We are here for a purpose.
 God has a plan and mission for our lives. That mission is to bring the good news of the love and mercy of God found in Jesus Christ to the world.

Gratitude. As Psalm 116
 says, "How shall I make a
 return to the Lord for all
 the good done for me?"
 We don't give of our
 resources to the Lord out
 of a sense of fear or compulsion but rather with
 gratefulness and genuine
 appreciation for all His
 goodness to us personally.

The real goal of living generously is to become more like God. We want to draw closer to the Lord Jesus Christ, to dedicate or re-dedicate every aspect of our lives to God. When we give, we become more like God, for "God demonstrates His own love toward us, in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us." (Romans 5:8)

Think about how the Lord wants you to personally respond to the call to be a good steward. It is important not only to pray about this, but also to discuss it with others. If you are married, talk to your spouse. If single, talk to someone you trust.

Jesus holds up "proportionate giving" as the ideal. Consider the widow's mite. (Luke 21:1-4) Even though the widow gave very little, Jesus praised her because she "gave from her substance." If the Lord has blessed you with more financial resources, then He is

Did you know?

- As of June 30, 2019, Christ the King had 882 registered households.
- Our average Sunday Mass attendance (adults and children) in October 2018 was 1,494.¹

- Approximately 19% of our donations for the year were received in December and 11% in March, with the remaining 70% coming in the other 10 months.
- Almost one-third (32%) of our income was donated through Online Giving last year.

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

Witness to Hope update

by Dcn. Larry Randolph In 2017, Christ the King participated in the Diocese of Lansing Witness to Hope (WTH) capital campaign. This campaign was to raise money for both the Diocese and for capital projects here at CTK. CTK's total WTH goal was to raise \$4 million, of which approximately \$1 million was to go to the Diocese and \$3 million to CTK for three capital projects: expanding the Church narthex, finishing the Church lower level, and expanding the parking lots.

Although we met our Diocesan goal, we fell short of our local goal by \$1.3 million. So far, the parish has received about \$466,000 in pledge payments, plus about \$9,000 in

interest. Since at this point we have only enough money pledged to do one of the three projects, the Facilities Commission—Dorothy Babcock, Gint Gaska, Dcn. Larry Randolph, Greg Stout, and Tim Stout—is working to get more specific cost estimates for the narthex and lower level.

As part of that process,

we have engaged architects to provide interior drawings and elevations so we can have a better idea of what the spaces would look like. We are also looking at different options that could be included if funds allow. For example, one option for the narthex expansion would be to include a canopy out to the circle driveway.

The drawings have been completed, so we are now using them to get more detailed cost estimates. Once those are obtained, we will look at the difference between what the projects will actually cost and what the WTH campaign has actually brought in. With that information, we will determine what to do next.

Please keep this project in your prayers as we discern the Lord's will going forward.



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calling you to give more. If not, then it's OK to give less.

Many parishioners at Christ the King practice the biblical teaching of tithing, which is a giving back of the "first fruits" –the first and best part of the fruits of our labors in thanksgiving and acknowledgement that all of our resources belong to God. These parishioners give 10 percent or more of their

gross income back to the Lord. As a practical guideline, we suggest 5 percent to your parish, 1 percent to the diocese, and 4 percent to other causes.

If you are not currently contributing to the Church or are new to the concept of proportionate giving, please prayerfully consider what the Lord may be calling you to now. Some people start by giving 1 percent of their income, and then increase that over time.

In any case, we will never judge anyone for how much they choose to give. Instead, we are delighted that you are part of the Body of Christ and we pray for and encourage your growth as an intentional disciple of our Lord.
