Editor's note: This article was originally sent as a letter via email to Christ the King parishioners on Nov. 17, 2020.

My friends in Christ the King,

Grace and peace to you from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ! That's a great way to start an important letter—at least St. Paul thought so! But seriously, this is a gift that we all have for each other: the ability to cooperate with each other so that grace and peace can be found more and more in our hearts, in our families, in our parish. Bishop Boyea in a recent Friday Memo had a wonderful quote from the great St. John Henry Newman to help us in this never-ending task:

Lead, Kindly Light,
amid the encircling gloom,
Lead Thou me on!
The night is dark,
and I am far from home —
Lead Thou me on!

As we face, realistically and unafraid, the "encircling gloom," we do it with a conscious awareness of the truth that guides our lives: "The Light shines in the darkness and the darkness cannot overpower it." (John 1:5) As we celebrate the great Solemnity which concludes our liturgical year and is the source of our parish name, Christ the King, we encourage each other with this fact: darkness must flee before the onslaught of the Light! For us, the Light is a Person Who loves us beyond words, and Whose words to us during this interesting time include: "Peace I leave with you, My peace I give to you... Let not your hearts be troubled, neither let them be afraid." (John 14:27).

One of the reasons why we have nothing to fear was well-expressed in my favorite '70s poster. It had a picture of the Lord Jesus holding the globe

and the caption read, "I don't know what the future holds, but I know Who holds the future!"

Do we believe that? As we enter into another shutdown, it can be very challenging to believe that the Lord Jesus holds the future in His hands. The worldly circumstances that constantly scream for our attention and the spiritual warfare that frequently accompanies them conspire together to get us to doubt Who He is and what He is capable of. The difficulties we are experiencing personally, in our families and in the other situations in I our lives, can all join in the chorus of those inviting us to not trust Him, that the problems are too great.

Several years ago when I spent a week with St. Teresa of Calcutta, I noticed that when her folks were giving reports to her about how things were going with the Missionaries of Charity in different parts of the world, if they ever used the word "problem" she immediately corrected them. She said, "There are gifts from God, and there are unusual gifts from God." Several of the folks immediately modified their reports to make mention of several "unusual gifts from God" that they were dealing with. It was moderately amusing, but she made the point. If that woman could have that attitude, as personally and inti-

Frequently Asked Questions about...

The Discipleship Pathway

As a parishioner, how do I fit into the Discipleship Pathway?

Good question! You can fit into any spot that works for you and your family. If attending or serving at Alpha isn't in the cards right now, consider joining a Connect Group, serving at a Sunday Liturgy, or joining a Bible Study.

Do I have to do things in a particular order?

No! The Holy Spirit works in our lives in ways that are unique and individual. We're excited for you to pray about where God might want you to start and to explore the different

options that are available to you.

I'm not a Catholic. Can I participate in the Discipleship Pathway?

Yes! All are welcome to join in any aspect of the Pathway where they feel comfortable. While we do recommend that you start with Alpha if you are just learning about the faith, please feel free to jump in at any of the points that appeal to you.

How was this Pathway developed?

It was developed through focus groups that we held with parishioners from 2018 to 2019 and through discussion with the leaders of ministries at Christ the King. The Directors and the Senior Leadership Team took all the feedback that we received and used that to develop the Discipleship Pathway.

How is this different from what we have been doing at Christ the King?

It is important to note that this pathway is not substantially different from what we have already been doing at CTK. Developing this pathway involved reorganizing all the ministries represented at the parish so that they are better supported by the staff and more accessible to parishioners.

Participation in Alpha and the Alpha Team is one way that we hope to facilitate this encounter, but there are others as well. We also strive for a hospitable and invitational culture that shows all parishioners that they are loved and welcomed.

All of us have gifts and passions that the Lord has placed in our hearts. Do you have a gift for listening and accompanying others during their struggles? The Stephen Ministry might be a great place for you to serve. Do you play an instrument and long to serve the Lord with that gift? Consider joining the Liturgy Team. Do you have a heart for those struggling with food insecurity or lack of medical care? Consider volunteering at Hope Clinic. Whatever gifts God has given you, we are dedicated to helping you use them!

I encourage you to look at the different parts of the pathway—Worship, Encounter, Grow, Serve—and pray about where God is asking you to jump in. The idea is not that each parishioner would be involved in every single element of this pathway at every time, but that you would discern what God wants you to do given your current circumstances. For a while, He may be asking you to invest your time in a Discipleship Group (Grow), but then He may ask you to serve on the Alpha Team (Encounter) or the Liturgy Team (Serve/Worship), or to attend Upper Room (Worship) more regularly. Discipleship is not a linear process; it's a continual work in progress. What God is asking us to do with our time often changes with the current circumstances of our lives.

You may be thinking that this is an odd time to try to do something like roll out the Discipleship Pathway. I believe that now, more than ever, is the time to make a decision to allow yourself to be pursued and caught by Jesus, the Good Shepherd. Our commitment to you as the staff of Christ the King is that we will walk with you on that journey. We will do our best to love and support you as you put out into the deep.

mately familiar as she was with the worst situations of human life, and especially during a time when she was apparently experiencing significant personal spiritual darkness, then we should take heart and make that attitude our own.

The key is having hope. Bishop Boyea addressed that in his Memo as well:

It can be easy at times simply to despair, to give up. That is why we are grateful that God graced us with this wonderful virtue which keeps us going, which motivates us, which helps us to have faith and love and to live out all the other virtues. This hope, to which we cling, is a life-line to the Father which he has placed in our hearts and souls. We are "encouraged to hold fast to the hope that lies before us. This we have as an anchor of the soul, sure and firm..." Let us hold on to this gift and eagerly become the sons and daughters God desires us to be.

In this challenging time, perhaps the greatest threat to our identity as disciples of the Lord Jesus is not an attack on our faith or love, but an ongoing attack on our hope. How do we counter this attack? I believe that one of the most effective ways that we can protect and increase not only our hope but our faith and love as well is by cooperating with the Holy Spirit as He leads us in the task of becoming more and more the disciples the Lord Jesus has called us to be.

Our Discipleship Pathway was designed with exactly that in



mind. This is the way we can fulfill that crucial final clause in Pope St. John Paul the Great's definition of conversion: "Conversion means accepting, by a personal decision, the saving sovereignty of Christ and becoming his disciple." (Redemptoris Missio, #46, emphasis added). What was the consequence of this in his life? I believe that his active and ongoing engagement with "becoming His disciple" resulted in his ability to constantly proclaim to the rest of us: "Be not afraid!" Like St. Teresa of Calcutta, he had seen much of the worst that humanity can do, both from the Nazis and the Communists, and yet, like her, because of his faith, hope, and love, born out of his ongoing efforts as a disciple, he could proclaim to us, "Be not afraid" because it worked for him! Because he had followed his own advice to "Open wide the doors of your heart to Christ," fear was not a problem. He knew Who he trusted and Who was the source of his hope. Well, we know Who we trust and Who is the source of our hope!

The various components of our Discipleship Pathway were designed precisely so that we could grow in that faith, hope, and love as His disciples, constantly falling more deeply in love with Him, with His Father, and with Their Holy Spirit.

The heart of our relationship with the Lord Jesus is our Worship, especially during the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, but also during those times of charismatic praise and worship that He has so gifted us with as a parish. When we focus on Him as the center of our worship, when we focus on the King and not on the storm, then we protect our hope, for we are focusing on its source.

The better we know Him, the better we can worship Him, which is why we have built an **Encounter** dimension into our pathway. So many people in the parish, youth and adults as well, have encountered Him in a variety of powerful ways in the past. However, the Lord Jesus never intends that our encounters with Him simply be part of our history—He intends that ongoing encounters with Him be in our present as well. It is never enough to look back and remember when I used to have powerful encounters with the Lord Jesus. Now is the time to have, even for the first time, or to enhance those encounters even more. No personal relationship in our life is going to thrive if it simply coasts on past encounters; that is especially true of our

Thank you to all who prayed about whether we should adopt the Catholic Community of Flint as a Sister Parish. The important final step in the discernment process was to consult with parishioners. We did that through a survey; 296 adult members responded, with 82% in favor.

Comments received

Representative comments (paraphrased) that we received included:

- This is a wonderful idea; my family is interested in hearing even more ways we can support Flint.
- Great opportunity to contribute to racial reconciliation.
- Blessed opportunity for outreach and to assist in enriching lives of families and their children
- They are close enough so folks who want to can get involved.
- We will give additional money to support this effort.

- I believe God wants us looking outward, not on ourselves and our "first world problems."
- Would love to be informed of volunteer opportunities.

Some "cautionary comments" included the following:

- I think partnering with other parishes would be better
- Do not think now is the right time to commit more resources and time
- Need to focus on taking care of families in the parish
- How does this fit into our calling as a parish?

We take these comments seriously; they highlight important issues to consider. We will keep them in mind as we move forward and periodically evaluate our relationship with Flint.

Sister Parish defined

Sister Parish means:

- 1. We pray for them regularly.
- 2. We will take up a special collection each year to support their needs. This year, we will

- target a minimum of \$20,000 to support the work of Sr. Christina Frey, SGL, who ministers to families and children in Flint's poorest neighborhoods. We are currently planning to do this on Ash Wednesday.
- 3. We will make opportunities available for our parishioners to provide scholarships for kids to attend the Catholic schools in Flint.
- 4. We will explore other ways to become involved with parish life there.

Next steps

- Identify a leader and team to support this effort.
- Set up a page on our website to publicize ways to serve, material needs, and contact information.
- Arrange fundraising opportunities to support scholarships for the Flint Catholic schools.



DIOCESAN SUPPORT

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Charitable giving and the New Tax Act

Charitable planning is very different for those under or over age 70 1/2

The primary purpose of charitable giving is to support the Church and other charitable causes, not to obtain tax benefits. Nonetheless, it is important to understand how your giving may be affected by changes in the tax law in order to take advantage of any tax deductions associated with your

charitable gifts.

Under Age 70 ½: Change in Standard Deduction

One of the biggest changes in the new act was the doubling of the standard deduction. This means that there is no need to track itemized deductions unless total deductions exceed the new standards: \$12,000 for singles and married couples filing separately, \$18,000 for heads of households, and \$24,000 for married couples filing jointly. This change in the standard

deduction does not affect:People who formerly

- claimed the standard deduction.
- Those who have made extremely large charitable gifts and are well beyond the new standard deduction level.

The law can affect, however, those who itemized under the old law, but whose deductions will now fall near or below the higher standard deduction limit. There are options for these people to consider:

1) Continue Current Pattern of Charitable Giving Most individuals will likely continue their current pattern of giving and not worry about the impact of the new law.

2) Bunch Charitable Gifts

Some may bunch their charitable giving so as to make two or three years' worth of gifts in a single year. By concentrating the gifts in one year, they can itemize in that year and use the standard deduction in the alternate years.

One of the practical considerations of bunching is that the donor must have the funds available at the end of the bunching year in order to prepay the following year's planned contributions. This issue can sometimes be addressed by using gifts of securities rather than cash. This has the added advantage of providing a charitable deduction without having to recognize any capital gain.

Some may prefer to bunch their gifts in one year but still have the payments spread out over time. One technique that can address this issue is the use of a donor-advised fund, that is, a fund which allows a contribution to be made in one year but allows those funds to be redistributed to charity over time as requested by the donor. Donoradvised funds are operated by many institutions including the Catholic Foundation of Michigan (Archdiocese of Detroit), The Catholic Foundation of the Diocese of Lansing (soon), and most financial institutions.

Over Age 70 ½: Dramatic New Opportunities

Individuals who are over 70 ½ and have IRAs have a great opportunity under the charitable rollover rules. Individuals age 70 ½ or older may transfer funds directly from their IRAs to a charitable organization without needing to report the withdrawal as taxable income. This will give them a 100% reduction in income for their gifts, whereas they might not have received any benefit for a direct cash gift. This benefit is so dramatic that most individuals over 70 ½ should be making all charitable contributions from their IRAs.

Individuals interested in learning how the new tax law affects their own situation should discuss these issues with their own tax advisor or financial planner.


